<p>Summary — Monroe Freeling is a high-upside, traits-driven offensive tackle with a prototype frame and outstanding athletic profile for the position. At his size, he is a fluid, explosive mover with excellent foot speed, lateral quickness, and range, allowing him to operate effectively both in pass protection and as a movement blocker in space. With long limbs and natural length, Freeling has the physical tools to control reps and keep defenders outside his frame, while his movement skills make him an ideal fit for outside zone and movement-based offensive schemes. Despite having just one year of starting experience, he showed steady growth throughout the season, taking a noticeable step forward from the previous year and continuing to improve week-to-week. His ability to reach landmarks quickly, mirror rushers, and recover with his foot speed highlights his natural pass protection upside, while flashes of hand usage development and advanced techniques suggest a strong developmental trajectory. Freeling's projection is rooted in his upside, but his evaluation remains heavily dependent on continued refinement and physical development. He currently carries a lean build with a high center of gravity, which can impact his balance and allow defenders to access his frame, particularly against power. His anchor is still developing, often conceding ground gradually rather than dropping and holding firm at first contact. While his hand usage has improved, it remains inconsistent, with wide or poorly timed strikes requiring frequent resets that do not always come in time. He is also still developing his processing and overall consistency in pass protection, where he can be late to react to inside counters, overset, or rely on leaning rather than trusting his footwork. In the run game, while he is highly effective on the move, his technique at the point of attack can be inconsistent, with issues in leverage, angles, and sustaining blocks. Overall, Freeling projects as a high-ceiling offensive tackle whose long-term success will depend on adding functional strength, refining his technique, and gaining experience. In the right system and with continued development, he has the upside to develop into a long-term starting left tackle, though his current profile carries more projection and risk than some of his peers.</p>								
<p>What Encouraged Me</p> <p>High Upside — Freeling offers one of the higher ceilings in the tackle class due to his athletic traits, frame projection, and developmental trajectory. He showed clear year-to-year growth from 2024 to 2025, indicating strong developmental upside. If he continues to add strength and refine his technique, he has legitimate starting left tackle potential in an athletic, movement-based scheme, with his ceiling tied to continued physical and technical development. Freeling's best tape was in the back half of the season showing upward growth through the course of his final season at Georgia.</p> <p>Physical Profile — Freeling has prototype size, length, and frame projection for a franchise left tackle. He has long limbs with room to add functional mass and is a plus athlete for the position with fluid movement skills, quick feet, and strong agility. His athletic profile translates well in both pass protection and run game situations that demand range and space ability, though he still carries a lean build with a high center of gravity.</p> <p>Durability — Freeling has shown good overall durability and availability with no major injury concerns impacting his development to this point. His frame and athletic build suggest he can withstand the demands of the position long term, though added functional mass will be important to handling consistent NFL power at the point of attack.</p> <p>Athleticism — Freeling is an outstanding athlete for his size with fluid movement skills, quick feet, and strong overall agility. He gets out of his stance quickly, climbs to landmarks efficiently, and shows excellent ability to work in space. His mobility allows him to handle movement-based blocks and projects well in outside zone concepts.</p> <p>Pass Protection — He shows excellent range to reach set points quickly and adjust mid-rep. Freeling does a good job retracing on inside counters, passing off stunts efficiently, and staying balanced when asked to redirect. He has enough foot speed to mirror rushers and recover when initially stressed.</p> <p>Run Blocking — Freeling is an explosive and effective run blocker on the move. He shows strong target acquisition as a puller and is highly effective climbing to the second and third level. His athleticism translates into consistent displacement in space and creates clear rushing lanes when working in combination schemes.</p> <p>Hand Usage Growth — His hand usage improved significantly over the course of his most recent season. He</p>			<p>Areas for Growth or Concern</p> <p>Experience and Consistency — Freeling has 2 years of starting experience, but remains a bit of a developmental prospect with clear highs and lows. His projection is strong, but his floor is tied to continued technical refinement and consistency across all phases. Some of his highlights are some of the best in the class, but the low-lights would lead someone asking themselves how they could justify Freeling in the first round — continued development will be required and consistency will need to be improved if he wants to establish himself as a franchise left tackle in the NFL.</p> <p>Physical Profile — He has a lean build with a high center of gravity, which can allow defenders into his frame. This leads to situations where he is stood up or loses leverage in contact situations, particularly when he plays too tall.</p> <p>Play Strength and Anchor Consistency — Freeling's anchor is still developing and can be inconsistent against power. He can be walked back when his base is compromised and needs continued strength development to consistently hold firm against NFL-caliber rushers.</p> <p>Run Blocking Consistency — While effective in space, he can occasionally lean over his toes in the run game. This results in lunging, losing balance, or falling off blocks, particularly on the edge when his technique breaks down.</p> <p>Pass Protections Inconsistencies — Freeling is still developing his ability to process complex rush plans and stunts. He can be late to recognize inside counters and inconsistent in pass set timing. His wide initial hand strikes and inconsistent re-fit technique can lead to lost reps when he fails to re-establish leverage.</p>
